• The Building Blocks of Communication | Drillfield Kathleen Wright, TTAC at Virginia Tech

Developing language and communication skills is critical for young children's overall school success as they relate to their ability to interact with others and their social-emotional development. Creating a language-rich environment provides children with opportunities to become active participants in activities and engage in communicative interactions with others. This session provides ideas for increasing teacher-child interactions with a focus on Universal Design for Learning (UDL), Core Vocabulary, and communication development in mind. CDA COMPETENCY II

We will learn about how young children learn music and make connections between music and other learning domains. Next we will engage in simple, developmentally appropriate music activities that can be easily incorporated in early childhood classrooms. Affordability, accessibility, and advocacy are three essential components underlying effective early childhood education programs. This workshop will introduce these components, their current state in Virginia, and opportunities available for providers to expand their programs. • Supporting Emotional Development and Well-Being in Toddlers and Preschoolers | Drillfield Rosanna Breaux, Child Study Center at Virginia Tech

This workshop will provide an overview of emotional development during toddlerhood and the preschool years. As part of this overview, information on screeners that can be used to assess when milestones in emotion awareness and regulation are not met will be discussed. The majority of this workshop will focus on offering and practicing coping strategies and sharing resources that can be used in the classroom to support children's emotional wellbeing during these developmental periods.

• Compassion Fatigue and Emotional Intelligence: How to Better Understand and Help Ourselves | Duck Pond

Emotional intelligence plays a central role in overall wellness of those most likely to experience compassion fatigue. Compassion fatigue is an underestimated occupational hazard for those who provide care-based services and may result in severe consequences, including the inability to engage in productive relationships, increased anxiety, reduced empathy, and a diminished sense of personal safety. In this session, we will reflect and discuss strategies to lessen the impact of compassion fatigue by strengthening our emotional intelligence.

• Staff Appreciation: It's the Little Things | Cascades B Helen Wallace, Giles Health and Family Center

Educator and directors will be able to recognize the importance of showing employees appreciation and gratitude for effort and jobs well done. This not only improves morale, work ethic, and effort invested, but potentially staff retention.

Child Study Center, Virginia Tech

Rosanna Breaux, PhD, is a licensed clinical psychologist, Director of the Child Study Center at Virginia Tech, and an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychology at Virginia Tech. Dr. Breaux's research focuses on the social-emotional and academic functioning of children and adolescents. She is also interested in understanding the role parents play in shaping children and adolescent's socialemotional development, with a focus on emotion regulation. Dr. Breaux received her bachelor's degree in psychology from Carnegie Mellon and her Master's and Doctorate in Clinical Psychology from the University of Massachusetts Amherst. She has provided therapy and assessment services to children, adolescents, and families for the past 12 years, and is the mother to toddler twins.



PATRICIA EITEMILLER

Early Childhood Division, City of Alexandria, Virginia

Patricia "Patty" Eitemiller is an Early Childhood Professional and Trainer for the City of Alexandria's Early Childhood Division. She designs, develops, and facilitates professional development activities and trainings for the various programs and professionals within the City of Alexandria that serve and support children birth to age five. Prior to her current position, she served as a developmental therapist for the Infant and Toddler Connection of Alexandria. She is a certified trainer of the Zero to Three "The Growing Brain" curriculum, the Ages & Stages Questionnaires (ASQ-3 & ASQ:SE-2), the Children's Trust Alliance Protective Factors, the STREAMin3 curriculum, and the Mind in the Making. She is passionate about early intervention, the collaboration amongst the many colleagues with whom she has worked over the years, and learning the stories about the families and children with whom she has connected.

Music Education, Radford University Corey Herd Cassidy is a Professor in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at Radford University. She also holds a secondary appointment as Professor in the Department of Health Systems and Implementation Science at the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine. Corey is a licensed speech-language pathologist who has provided services to young children and their families for more than 25 years in multiple states across the country. Her teaching and scholarship focus on addressing the needs of children between birthfive, although early intervention is her passion. She loves collaborating with and learning from colleagues across disciplines and educating students to do the same.

Dr. Jennifer S. McDonel is Director of Music Education at Radford University, where she teaches early childhood and elementary music education courses and was the 2022 recipient of the Donald N. Dedmon Distinguished Teaching Professor award. She has spent over three decades teaching music and mentoring students from birth to adulthood. She co-developed the Harmony & HeartTM music program for Primrose Schools, a national early education and care franchise. Her early childhood music compositions and activities are featured in music teaching resources as well as in the Zero-To-Three.org "Problem Solvers" early childhood mathematics curriculum. Her album from that project, Little Beats: Counting, Shapes, and Sets is available on all streaming services and received Grammy award consideration.

- Provide high-quality early care and learning to young children during the most critical years of their brain development.
- Provide onsite mentorship and experiential learning to aspiring early childhood education professionals.
- Advocate for child directed, play-based and social-constructivist learning.

Ensuring a healthy, safe and respectful early learning environment is a priority while also striving to foster autonomy, empathy, selfregulation, conflict resolution and critical thinking skills. Our approach empowers children to co-construct their knowledge collaboratively, create their own learning objectives, connect what is known and unknown while experiencing joy and success through play.








BREAKOUT ROOMS MAP
